Governor grants bars a reprieve for DST

Final Four revelers will be able to toast their teams after 2 a.m. this Sunday despite the start of daylightsaving time.

Gov. Mitch Daniels issued a statement Thursday saying bars, restaurants and taverns can change their clocks an hour after daylight-saving time kicks in at 2

a.m. Sunday. The switch to DST means that 2 a.m. will suddenly become 3 a.m. And that's when bars are supposed to shut down.

That lost hour, tavern owners said, would have meant a loss of at least \$250,000 in revenue.

faces longest term yet in price-fixing probe

ed.evanoff@indystar.com Federal antitrust lawyers Thursday pegged prominent Fishers concrete supplier Gus B. Nuckols III as a leader in the conspiracy to illegally drive up Indianapolis concrete prices.

Nuckols, president of Builder's Concrete & Supply, agreed to plead guilty to pricefixing, said federal officials who are recommending a 21-month prison term and company fines up to \$11.5 million.

The family-owned firm is the third local concrete supplier snared by the U.S. Department of Justice.

Nuckols could serve the longest sentence handed out so far in the probe that has set off a consumer class-action lawsuit against eight concrete firms, including Builder's.

A hearing is expected today in U.S. District Court in Indianapolis to set Nuckols' sentence and fines.

The plea agreement says Nuckols repeatedly phoned other executives and met with them in smaller groups "to ensure the compliance of his coconspirators with the conspiracy agreements."

Officials last summer said the conspiracy drove up the price of ready-mix concrete sold in the Indianapolis area from July 2000 to May 2004.
